MESSAGE FROM DIRECTOR OF RECREATION

The History of "O Canada"

"O Canada" was not adopted as Canada's official national anthem until 1980. That date might be surprising, as national anthems often have deep historical roots. In fact, "O Canada" is a very old song and for many years has been a popular musical tradition across Canada. But it took an entire century for the beloved tune to become Canada's official song, with many twists and turns along the way.

"O Canada" was composed in 1880 by Calixa Lavallée of Quebec. Lavallée was a highly regarded concert pianist. The Quebec government commissioned him to compose a song in honor of Canada's governor-general, John Douglas Sutherland Campbell, and his wife, Princess Louise, a daughter of Queen Victoria. The lyrics, all in French, were written by Sir Adolphe-Basile Routhier. Routhier was a lawyer and well-known poet. He, too, was a native of Quebec. On June 24, 1880, "O Canada" was performed for the first time at the National Congress of French Canadians for the governor-general and other honored guests.

While the song was well received, there was no movement to make it an official anthem. "O Canada" had a great deal of competition, as many patriotic songs were composed around the same time. And, in addition to all the other songs, multiple English language versions of "O Canada" began to circulate. One of these versions included the first stanza of a 1908 poem written by Robert Stanley Weir, a Montreal lawyer and poet. Over time, this was the version that grew most popular, and Weir's poem would eventually be accepted as the official English lyrics when the Canadian Parliament passed the National Anthem Act in 1980. The Anthem Act also made official the French lyrics, which were the original ones from 1880. Interestingly, as Weir's English lyrics were from a poem and not a translation of

ones from 1880. Interestingly, as Weir's English lyrics were from a poem and not a translation of the French lyrics, the anthem's French and English versions are complementary but not an exact translation.

BIRD OF THE MONTH

Eagle



The majestic bald eagle was named the national bird of the United States in 1782 by the Second Continental Congress. This stealthy, resilient, loyal bird represents the strength, freedom, courage, and independent spirit of the American people. Bald eagles live across Canada, the United States, and northern Mexico.

They prefer to soar across land near large bodies of open water and build enormous nests in old-growth forests. Alaska is home to the world's largest population of bald eagles, which is estimated at 30,000 birds. The superb hunters primarily subsist on fish but will also eat turtles, rabbits, snakes, waterfowl, and small mammals. Humans (via cars, power lines, and chemicals) pose the most substantial threat to bald eagles. However, efforts to protect the birds have been extremely successful—they moved off the list of threatened and endangered species on June 28, 2007.
